FROM THE PASTOR by Rev. Dr. Blythe D. Kieffer

Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Romans 12:15

A couple of weeks ago I preached on Mary and Martha and "The Gift of Hospitality." Taking my sister's advice about not putting down Martha, I highlighted the need to be neither too critical of Martha for her attention to details, nor Mary because she chose to sit at Jesus' feet. Both are necessary in the gift of hospitality. True hospitality is being sensitive to the needs of one's guests.

The week I preached that sermon I received word that the Reverend Dr. Jack Rogers died and I would like to take this opportunity to reflect on a remarkable man and patriarch within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the way he enriched my life.

I had the privilege of sitting at his feet (a metaphor for discipleship) when I attended Fuller Theological Seminary (1978-1981) where he was Professor of Theology. His warmth, openness, vast knowledge and sincere faith made a lasting impression on me. As a young woman coming out of a denomination that did not ordain woman, Dr. Rogers encouraged and empowered me in the call to ministry. Reading and discussing his book, *The Authority and Interpretation of the Bible: An Historical Approach* (with Donald McKim), my first year of seminary was life changing. When I was forced to miss the first semester of my second year due to the unexpected onset of shingles and Ramsey Hunt Syndrome which led to facial paralysis, I was astonished by his kindness when he wrote me a personal note offering his prayers and how much he missed "my smile."

Over the years, we stayed in touch. When he visited the Presbytery of Giddings-Lovejoy in St. Louis where I served as a pastor, I had the



privilege of welcoming Jack into our home and serving him a meal, an honor for which I am truly grateful. Believe me when I say, Peter and I attended to the details of that evening with great joy and diligence!

Jack was the Moderator of the 213th General Assembly of the PC(U.S.A.) from 2001-2002

during a contentious time in our denomination over an amendment to remove ordination restrictions for persons within same gender relationships. Jack absorbed incredible hostility as an advocate for our gay brothers and sisters. His book, *Jesus, the Bible, and Homosexuality: Explode the Myths, Heal the Church,* was instrumental in framing sacred texts and ushering in greater empathy, acceptance and inclusion of LGBTQ people in the life and leadership of the Church. For many people, this book was a spiritual game-changer of minds, hearts and relationships.

When the north and south united in 1983, Jack was on the committee which wrote *The Brief Statement of Faith* (a creed we affirm regularly in worship). Jack was also instrumental in the recent inclusion of the *Belhar Confession* (written in South Africa in response to apartheid.) I was honored to attend the 221th General Assembly in Detroit in 2014 and sit at the table with him when he received the Excellence in Theological Education Award for his contributions to theological education in the PC(U.S.A.).

When I applied to be your pastor, one of the letters of recommendation the PNC received was from Dr. Jack Rogers. His 2015 Christmas letter concluded with a personal message: "Blythe, your note has given me great encouragement and filled me with gratitude for the way you are carrying out your gracious ministry. Jack"


Thanks be to God, to whom we belong in life and in death, for the kind and hospitable life of the Rev. Dr. Jack Rogers.



ROAD TO EMMAUS 4:00 – 5:30 P.M. (THIRD FLOOR) CONFIRMATION AND JUNIOR HIGH YOUTH GROUP

Confirmation is the process through which our young people affirm the vows made at their baptism and become active members of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). At WPC, this journey is woven into fellowship time to build relationships.

CONFIRMATION PREP (GRADES 6-7) provides a solid grounding in the Bible, allowing for more expanded areas of study in 8th grade and high school. This year, 6th and 7th graders will study the New Testament through the curriculum *Echo the Story*, which offers creative responses and imaginative engagement with the biblical narratives. *Teachers: Anna Koeppel and Karen Sherrick*

CONFIRMATION (GRADE 8) focuses on Christian history, Presbyterian theology and polity and other religious traditions as the young people explore their individual lives of faith. Over the course of the year, students will visit other worshiping communities, build relationships with adult mentors, serve the community and write their own statements of faith. *Teachers: Rev. Hannah Dreitcer and guests.* Following class, all three grades come together for fellowship, fun and games in the Youth Room.

PROPERTY UPDATE by Gary Warnick


THE SANCTUARY STAINED GLASS PROTECTIVE COVERING PROJECT, which was approved by the Property Committee in May, will be completed this August by Brooks Art Glass. The *Life of Christ* window (above the Choir loft) will have a protective cover for the first time. The faded protective glass on the side windows will be replaced and properly vented. All the old window coverings are being recycled. The Westminster Endowment is providing the funds to make this project possible!

The photo on the right provides a contrasting view of the before and after effects.

THE TOWER ROOF AND THE ROOF OF THE EDUCATION WING NEAR THE ELEVATOR DOORS will be replaced in September by Henson-Robinson Company. Third floor walls and ceiling tiles which have been damaged by previous water damage are being repaired, painted or replaced in preparation for the new program year.
