STEADFAST NEIGHBOR ENDEAVOR PROCESSES FAITHFULLY

On Sunday, April 26, the congregation took a historic vote and overwhelmingly approved the Steadfast Neighbor Site and Landscape loan for up to \$1.3 million from the Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program. The interest will be between 3.5 and 3.76% and the loan will be paid back over 20 years. On April 7, the Presbytery of Great Rivers guaranteed the loan.

The Steadfast Neighbor Endeavor is possible because of the successful "Building a Legacy of Faith" Twenty-Year Anniversary Endowment Campaign. The loan payments will be made from the interest earned from our General Endowment which had a market value of \$4,062,600 on March 31, 2020. This General Endowment is part of the total Support and Endowment Fund, which had a market value of \$6,599,400 on March 31, 2020.

This endeavor fulfills the vision of our congregation, who voted to remain in our present location and to be a steadfast presence in this neighborhood 20 years ago. Today we are investing in our neighborhood by beautifying our grounds, expanding our parking, and reaching out to the neighborhood in the mission component, which will be one-third of the renovation costs. The mission funding will be made from the interest earned from our General Endowment. Neighbors will be invited to apply for matching grants or partake in the Steadfast Neighbor Service week August 10-14, 2020. A team of members are being recruited to do minor repairs and small landscape projects for homes in the neighborhood.

At their April 15 meeting, Session unanimously approved the Steadfast Neighbor bids presented by Strategic Planning Committee Chair, Dr. Todd Knox. Our parking lot was designed by Vasconcelles Engineering and will be constructed by O'Shea



Builders. The West Terrace and East Entry were designed by Architect John Shafer and will be completed by Sexton's Landscape Concepts. Lighting will be provided by Springfield Electric and installed by B&B Electrical Contractor. One of the silver linings of this cloud called "COVID-19" is that the parking lot work will begin immediately and completed with no phasing, saving close to \$100,000. Thank you to the members of the Strategic Planning Committee and task forces for their perseverance, collaboration, and fortitude.



Dr. Lee's Newly Published Book is Available

A few weeks ago, Heritage Books released Dr. Lee's book, A

Brief History of Belle Isle Plantation, Lancaster County, Virginia, 1650-1782. In the book, Dr. Lee identifies and interprets the rich cache of surviving archival and primary records relating to the Virginia colonial plantation that came to be called Belle Isle. After a long history as a Native American settlement visited by Captain John Smith in 1607 and 1608, this Rappahannock River plantation was first patented by Thomas Powell (d. 1670) as English settlers were pouring into this part of Virginia in 1650. In 1692,



a Huguenot-Anglican immigrant clergyman named John Bertrand (c. 1651–1701) purchased this 500-acre plantation that he later enlarged to 924 acres.

Dr. Lee has graciously donated a copy to our library. Books will also be available for purchase (\$22.50) on Founders' Sunday and a portion of the cost will go to the Special Church Support Endowment Fund in support of the Steadfast Neighbor Endeavor.

MARCH FINANCIAL REPORT by Lisa Runkle

We received strong support in the first quarter of 2020. Annual pledge donations received in full early in the year increased income to more than \$33,000 above budgeted revenue. Expenses are nearly \$13,000 under budget, so total income over expenses is \$45,939.

A MESSAGE FROM THE COVID-19 TASK FORCE

Your Coronavirus Task Force has been meeting weekly via Zoom. Our overall goal is to deliver accurate local information that affects our community and our congregation. This full report (with graphs) can be found on our website and is updated every Wednesday.

As of Tuesday, April 28 there are 153 positive tests in Sangamon County. This increase is due to (1) more testing, (2) our hospitals are bringing in cases from outside the county, and (3) there has been a major outbreak at The Villas, a senior care center in Sherman. The Villas has had 37 total cases (24 residents and 13 staff members).

State-wide, 90.4% of cases have been in Chicago and the surrounding counties. Sangamon County accounts for 0.33% of all Illinois cases. So, despite this week's spike in new cases, we remain relatively unaffected. This is good news in that our social distancing measures are working, but it also makes it easy to get complacent. We must guard against this, as there are numerous examples of outbreaks in areas that have prematurely loosened their restrictions.

Governor Pritzker announced modified Stay-At-Home orders for the month of May. It continues our current social distancing requirement but includes some modifications. These include outdoor recreation, nurseries and similar businesses, and nonessential retail businesses. Non-essential businesses must provide curbside pickup from telephone and online orders, while essential businesses must provide face coverings for all employees unable to maintain a six-foot circle. Most importantly, face coverings will be required for all people in all public spaces where a six-foot circle cannot be maintained and in all indoor facilities. That means you must wear a face covering when going to the grocery store, for example.

Despite the relaxation of some restrictions in Illinois, the task force feels strongly that we all need to remain vigilant in our preventative measures. Please continue to practice social distancing, stay at home if you can, wash your hands frequently, and wear a face covering when going out in public.

On a positive note, it was wonderful to see our church members gather online for our congregational meeting this past Sunday. 



God's Quiet Things by Nancy Sweetland

Written in soothing if unsurprising verse, this picture book raises children's consciousness to the quiet marvels found in nature: "Listen for God's quiet things, / like butterflies with velvet

wings, / or raindrops making / quiet rings on water."

Grandad's Prayers on Earth by Douglas Wood

Trees pray. Birds pray. Grandad eloquently describes how everything prays, but his grandson can't seem to hear nature's prayers. Years after Grandad's death, the boy discovers Grandad's message. He finds beauty in nature and feels his grandfather close once again. Stunning illustrations and lyrical text bring family together for this poignant story.

I'm in Charge of Me! by David Parker

This preschool aged book teaches self-control. This teaches them that making choices puts them in charge of their own behavior and they start to see the positive effect these choices have on how others see them and, most important, how they see themselves in the world.

Love by Matt de la Pena

Everything that can be called love -- from shared joy to comfort in the darkness -- is gathered in the pages of this reassuring, refreshingly honest children's picture book.

The Patchwork Path: A Quilt Map to Freedom by Bettye Shroud

An exciting story about a girl *and* her father who escape slavery with help from the coded symbols on a quilt. Shortly after Hannah's sister is sold to another plantation, Mama dies, but not before teaching Hannah how to sew, whispering to her,

"...this quilt will show you everything you need to know to run to freedom." It is a story of courage, determination, and hope.
